Many of these children have been and are continuing to be exposed to second hand smoke from their carers, the very people who should be protecting and not harming their children. The answer is simple. Ban cigarettes. Make nicotine patches the only available form that nicotine is available. Yes, people will object and complain about their rights to smoke but noone seems to be speaking up for the most delicate and vulnerable in our society who are unable to speak for themselves. One could argue that even allowing the sale of a drug that has the potential to harm those around them is tantamount to child abuse in of itself.
